

1. AESOP. The fables of Aesop, illustrated by Edward Detmold. London and New York: Hodder & Stoughton, 1909. 4to. With 25 colored plates accompanying the fables, each with tissue guard. Dark brown crushed morocco, elaborately paneled and decorated in gilt with tooled borders and floral designs, spine richly gilt in six compartments, inner covers decorated in gilt tooled borders with inlaid panels of colored morocco; cream moire silk endpapers, all edges gilt. An excellent copy.

Limited edition. The publisher apparently set aside one hundred copies for the American market, this being number 11 of 100. According to the publisher's note, "except where separately acknowledged the fables in this volume are printed from the third edition of Sir Roger L'Estrange's translations (1699). The publishers are indebted to Messr. George Routledge & Sons, Ltd., for permission to use those from the version of the Rev. G.F. Townsend." The twenty-five fables include all of your favorites ("The hare and the tortoise;" "The wasp and the snake;" "The town mouse and the country mouse;" and many more). Edward Detmold (1883–1957) and his twin brother Charles (1883–1908) were painters, printmakers and illustrators, among the most celebrated British artists of their time. Charles committed suicide in 1908; this was the first book Edward illustrated after his brother's death.



First Milan edition of an ancient work; the invention of this puzzle is unrecorded in history. Another work with the same title was published in Florence in the same year, though with fewer figures (only 122). Literally translated as "seven boards of skill," the tangram is a dissection puzzle with seven pieces in which players recombine them to form various shapes such as animals, letters, numbers, and other objects. The tangram was said to be invented in China over one thousand years ago, then carried to the west by nineteenth-century traders. The game helped train memory and logic. It boosts shape recognition, problem solving, and pattern design skills. The tangram has also been referred to as the earliest psychological test in the world. OCLC locates only one copy of this Milan imprint at Yale.

THE PORT-ROYAL LOGIC

Third edition in English, first printed (in French) in 1662 and in English in 1685, of the most celebrated and influential seventeenth-century treatise on logic, better known as the Port-Royal logic because the authors belonged to the sect of Jansenists who had their home at the convent of Port-Royal. The work deals with concept (idea), judgment, reasoning and method, with an interesting argument against negative numbers, later acknowledged by Leibniz. The geometric foundation of the work and its methodology owe much to Cartesian rationalism, as well as to the ideology of the authors' fellow Jansenist, Blaise Pascal. It has also been seen as a foundation work in probability theory, specifically in its attempts to axiomatically organize a science and to show its logical structure, taking as a model geometry. The 1818 English edition served as the basic text of logic at both Cambridge and Oxford.

4. BARROW, John. Travels in China, containing descriptions, observations, and comparisons, made and collected in the course of a short residence at the imperial palace of Yuen-Min-Yuen, and on a subsequent journey through the country from Pekin to Canton. . . . London: T. Cadell and W. Davies, 1806. 4to. With 8 plates, including the hand-colored frontispiece and 4 additional hand-colored aquatints. Half morocco with marbled boards.

Second edition. This is Sir John Barrow's account of his time as secretary to Lord Macartney during a British embassy mission to China in 1792-94. Barrow, an expert in Chinese affairs, studied the Chinese language while abroad, and this work includes his valuable observations on the topic, as well as many examples of Chinese characters. According to Hill, this book is "one of the best illustrated English travels on China . . . Barrow was an excellent observer, and the text contains a number of descriptions of Chinese artifacts and novelties. Among these are a plate of musical instruments, extensive renditions of Chinese melodies in western notation, and a long description, with illustration, of the abacus." Other chapters include passages on literature, medicine and science, social customs, government, and a sketch of the character and private life of the Emperor, whose portrait graces the frontispiece. \$ 1500.00


First edition of Bentham's critical examination of Richard Whately's *Elements of logic*, which was printed in the same year. It is here that the principle of the quantification of the predicate, "an augmented syllogistic scheme of an almost symbolic form," was first explicitly stated. Bentham closely analyzes every aspect of Whately's work, defining logic and treating the classification of entities, propositions, deductions and forms of syllogisms. Of particular importance is Bentham's discussion of Whately's support of Aristotelian rules of division, a defiant political gesture.




FIRST PRINTED BOOK ON METALLURGY

7. BIRINGUCCIO, Vannuccio. *Pirotechnia*. . . . Venice: [Giovan Padoana], 1550. 4to. Title and text with elaborate woodcut illustrations of various machines and apparatus. Vellum-backed marbled boards; contemporary annotations throughout.

Second edition. This was the first printed book dealing with metallurgy, "written for the practicing metallurgist, foundryman, dyer, type-founder, glass-maker, and maker of gunpowder, fireworks and chemicals used in warfare" (Dibner). Biringuccio here gives the earliest account of typecasting and the making of statues, medallions, and bells.

THE DISCOVERY OF PURE MATHEMATICS

8. BOOLE, George. An investigation of the laws of thought, on which are founded the mathematical theories of logic and probabilities. London: Walton and Maberly, 1854. 8vo. The errata leaf is at the end of the book, preceded by the "Note". Inserted is a 14-page publisher's catalogue dated August, 1856, followed by a 2-page advertisement for Dr. Lardner's Museum of Science and Art. Rebound in half-calf and marbled boards.

First edition, possibly the first issue of this classic work on symbolic logic, now quite scarce, or otherwise possibly a variant issue altogether. Boole demonstrated how the laws of formal logic could be incorporated into a calculus. This combination of the two fields revolutionized mathematics, philosophy, and linguistics, and paved the way for the design of high-speed computers. The issue points are in question here as the book has been rebound. The first issue apparently finds the errata leaf at the end (as in this copy), but it is possible it could have been moved when the book was rebound.



STEP-BY-STEP GUIDELINES FOR EXORCISM

First edition of this extraordinary manual on exorcism meant for clergy in charge of dealing with cases of demoniac activities and behaviors. The author, who specialized in the process of identification and diagnosis of possessions of preternatural origin, analyzes the unmistakable signs of the possession, providing detailed descriptions of the symptoms of the presence of evil, detailed *formulae* for the recognition of the state of demoniacal possession, for the discovery of a demon's name and most importantly the step-by-step directions for the expulsion of demons.


He also lists a variety of poor and ill-chosen techniques some exorcists use, among them slapping possessed people and beating them in cruel and ferocious means inappropriate and sinful for exorcists. This book enjoyed a large success thanks to the support of his Franciscan order before it was placed on the Index in 1727 due to the perception that Brognolo was overly critical of the Church and its approach toward exorcism. \$4500.00



First edition of this extraordinary eyewitness account of the 1906 San Francisco Earthquake. The author was on a trip to the Bay Area, staying at the St. Francis Hotel. Readers are literally provided with a continuous narrative of the earthquake and its aftermath, from the reactions of other hotel guests to the structural damage caused by the quake to the deadly fires that raged afterwards. Reading the account is tantamount to experiencing the events of that fateful day and the week that followed. The San Francisco earthquake of April 18, 1906 ranks as one of the most significant earthquakes of all time. \$300.00

First edition, first issue of this most popular word puzzle, invented by Carroll, that became a parlor craze in its time. Sophia Neate (1832 -1908) of Heatherside, Woking, took on the care of Sally Sinclair and her siblings, whom Dodgson liked very much, when their parents died. Neate was supported financially by Dodgson and the actor Lionel Brough. On first meeting Mrs. Neate on June 26, 1879, Dodgson wrote in his diary that he 'found her so interesting that I stayed 4 hours!'



First edition of Cournot's popular and successful work on the theory of chance occurrences. Cournot interprets values of objective occurrences as a degree of what he calls "physical probability." He also insisted on the necessary distinction between objective and subjective probability (depending upon ignorance and resting upon the consideration of events that are deemed equiprobable). He also was able to show clearly the importance of the applications of the calculus of probability to the scientific description and explanation of human acts.




Second American edition. This novel "relates the development into manhood of a sensitive, trusting boy beset from every side with crushing difficulties;" it was so popular that it was made into a motion picture in 1946. The film starred Charles Coburn, Tom Drake, Hume Cronyn, Dean Stockwell, Jessica Tandy, Richard Haydn, Wallace Ford, and Selena Royle, all of whom signed the front fly-leaf (amongst many other actors from the film). The signatures of the crew members, including the cameraman, wardrobe, scriptwriter, make-up artists and more adorn the rear fly-leaf. \$ 1250.00

First edition, first printing of Cullen's very first collection of poetry, published when he was only 22 years old. This work contains what is widely regarded as his most famous poem, "Yet I do Marvel." Cullen's idealistic view of poetry as something transcendent of race made his work popular among both black and white audiences at the time. \$1500.00

First edition, first issue of Darwin's great contribution to the descent theory, and the foundation on which all later racial-biological research was based. This work expands in detail material that Darwin had intended to include in his *Origin*. The most novel element in the work is Darwin's hypothesis of pangenesis, by which he attempts to explain hereditary resemblance, inheritance of acquired characteristics, atavism and regeneration. \$ 3000.00



First edition of this fascinating look at the current thinking in geology. Although Denton was a confirmed atheist, his text is balanced and scientific in nature. He first reveals a short history of geology, treats the earth's internal and external structure, including volcanoes and causes of earthquakes, deals with the age of the earth, the formation of coal, the source of salt in the oceans, fossils, and then proceeds to the truth regarding the Flood, ice ages, and a picture of early man and his use of stone. The final portion covers the future, including fuel and climate change, as well as the destiny of the earth, especially with respect to future population growth. Denton was well known for having debated, in 1858, future president James A. Garfield, who defended God in a several-day debate on geology and religion. \$200.00


First and only edition. While primitive underwater breathing methods had been around for centuries, individual suits were a vast improvement over early apparatus such as the bell-shaped helmet. The work featured here focuses on a very specific type of diving suit patented by Joseph-Martin Cabriol. Though far from safe by today's standards, the Cabriol diving suit did represent a leap forward with certain safety features. \$3500.00

First edition, written a few years after the establishment of Yellowstone as a national park in 1872. Dunraven praises the United States for their national parks, exclaiming that the "privilege of viewing the marvels of nature . . . should forever be free to all nations and all people." In this personal account, he views the area's natural wonders and observes local culture. \$1250.00

A REMARKABLE EXAMPLE OF VICTORIAN PRINTING

27. [EUCLID] BYRNE, Oliver. The first six books of the elements of Euclid in which coloured diagrams and symbols are used instead of letters for the greater ease of learners. London: William Pickering, 1847. 4to. Illustrated throughout in three colors and black. Original blue publisher's cloth (rare); spine rebacked, text exceptionally clean which is quite unusual for this book. Overall a very handsome copy.

First and only edition of Byrne's work on Euclidean geometry, in which colors are substituted for the usual letters to designate the angles and lines of geometric figures. Written and designed to simplify Euclid's propositions, this remarkable example of Victorian printing is described by Rauri McLean as "one of the oddest and most beautiful books of the whole century." The printing proved to be extremely difficult, requiring exact registration; only one thousand copies were originally published.

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

A TRADITION OF VIOLENCE EXPLAINED

First edition of this important work that examines the militant tradition of the American south. Drawn mainly from primary sources and eye-witness accounts, Professor Franklin here aims to understand the reasons behind the region's reputation for bellicosity. Franklin (1915–2009) was an eminent African-American historian and the recipient of numerous awards and honorary appointments including the Presidential Medal of Freedom and the John W. Kluge Prize for the study of Humanities. He received his PhD from Harvard and served as professor at such distinguished universities as Duke and the University of Chicago. \$650.00

THE FIRST FINELY PRINTED BOOK ILLUSTRATED BY JOHN & THOMAS BEWICK

First octavo edition (first published in quarto format in 1795). This book reveals the technical innovation and creative skill of an artist who would radically change the art of book illustration in the next century. Written in two parts, the first includes a biography of Goldsmith plus his two poems, *The Traveller* and *The Deserted village*. The second contains a biographical sketch on Parnell, written by Goldsmith, as well as Parnell's poem, *The Hermit*. The quality of Bewick's engravings was so fine, that at the time of publication, many, including George III, did not believe that the engravings were done on wood, but rather copper. \$550.00

He includes folding maps of the world, Europe and individual countries, Russia, the British Isles, Asia, the East and West Indies, Africa, and North and South America. Of particular interest is the map of North America, showing the as yet unexplored northwest America and Canada as "Unknown Parts." Also bound in is a large table listing all international currency and its British equivalent. Pemberton (1723–1809), a Philadelphia merchant and philanthropist, was among the founders of the Philadelphia Hospital and succeeded Benjamin Franklin as president of the Pennsylvania Abolition Society in 1790. He was sent to exile because he didn't join the military during the American Revolution.



Though the later edition contains a more substantive account of the reign of Henry VIII, this passage as well as the cause of the quarrel between Edward IV and the Earl of Warwick was suppressed. The Chronicle covers the history of Britain and England from its mythical foundation by the Greek princess Albina and her twenty-nine sisters to the end of Henry VI's minority. Among other things, Hardyng details the origins of British history in the myth of Troy and the subsequent founding of empires by those escaping the doomed city. The work is also one of the best sources for information on King Arthur, mingling historical narrative with aspects of the myth of the Round Table and Holy Grail. Indeed, apparently Hardyng's Chronicle is one of the major sources of Sir Thomas Malory's Morte d'Arthur.







The death of the Royal Society's secretary, Henry Oldenburg, in 1677 interrupted the publication of the Philosophical transactions. These scientific papers, edited by Hooke, were issued to fill the void in the Royal Society publication from the last number of the Philosophical transactions in 1679 until it resumed again in 1682/3. Hooke, who was also Curator of Experiments, contributed a couple of important papers, including An optical discourse, which proposed treatment for near-sightedness, and A mechanical discourse. . . . Other landmark papers include: Leeuwenhoek's announcement of the "discovery of spermatozoa"; Lana's "flying chariot" Borelli's De motu musculorum; Tyson's Anatomy of a porpess (sic); and astronomical observations by Hevelius, Flamsteed, and Cassini on the eclipse of Jupiter by the moon in 1679 and 1681. This, his most comprehensive and systematic philosophical work, presents Mill's thoughts on inductive logic and the shortcomings of the use of syllogisms (arguments derived from general principles, in which two premises are used to deduce a conclusion) to advance deductive logic. Initially Mills defines his general terms, and then further examines deduction and induction. He distinguishes between uniformity of "togetherness", where properties that exist at the same time and can be measured or counted so as to give our knowledge a formal order, and uniformity of sequence, where properties are more "causal" and laws must be established with the "eliminative methods of induction". Even mathematics, claimed Mill, is, in a way, inductive. The remainder of the work discusses a variety of operations of the mind, such as observation, abstraction and naming, which are presupposed in all induction or instrumental to more complicated forms of induction, as well as revealing fallacies of reasoning.





A major underlying theme is an impending invasion of Europe by Muslim forces from further east and south headed by the expected Antichrist. Nostradamus has been credited, for the most part in hindsight, with predicting numerous events in world history, from the Great Fire of London, and the rise of Napoleon and Adolf Hitler, to the September 11 attacks on the World Trade Center.

Little is known about the publisher or the engraver, J. Parry. A record at the Folger Shakespeare Library suggests he is the Manchester painter Joseph Parry (1744–1826). The number of plates varies in each copy; there appears to be as few as 8 plates and as many as 20.







The first advertisement for Psychiana, which Robinson himself penned and took around to local publishers in Spokane, Washington in 1929, featured a picture of Robinson with the headline, "I TALKED WITH GOD (yes I did, actually and literally)." Those who expressed an interest in Robinson's promises by responding to one of his ads were offered a series of bi-weekly lessons by mail on a subscription plan. Robinson had his own printing presses and started a small publishing company, which offered many of his own books on various spiritual themes. \$ 3500.00

Originally printed in 1907, Salomé was certainly one of Beardsley's best-known illustrated works. Beardsley captures the underlying ideas addressing sexuality and gender roles throughout the story. He brings these things to life in his illustrations, starting as early as the title page, which has a beautifully detailed yet disturbing drawing of a demonic hermaphrodite. And the book ends ending with one of the most gorgeous scenes, wherein an androgynous Salome holds the prophet=s decapitated head. The original 1891 version of the play was in French. Sarah Bernhardt was to star in the London debut of the play, but the 1892 rehearsals were halted by the censor, banning the production on the basis that it was illegal to depict Biblical characters on the stage. The play was eventually premiered in 1896 while Wilde was in prison.
